Life in Rokkasho-village for five years and five months

I left IFERC this March and returned to the company in Kawasaki near Tokyo which I work for. I was able to have a completely different experience, leaving such a big city in November 2010 and living in Rokkasho up to March 2016. So, I would like to share some of my experiences with you.

1. Blizzard

3. Fishing paradise



For example, flatfish, mackerel, horse mackerel, sardine, sillaginoid, pacific cod, Spanish mackerel, sea bream, tuna, hair crab...It is impossible to list all kinds of fish

which we can catch in the sea.



4. Gold dust

Mining gold dust is the most important and interesting hobby for me. As written in "The Travels of Marco Polo", there are many places where gold can be mined in Japan. I took on a challenge of mining gold dust in Aomori-prefecture and was able to collect some as shown in the next photograph (Of course, the place is secret).
